## Calendars feature the works of Riverside Middle artists

Riverside Middle School is providing people the opportunity to do both.

Students from the school are selling calendars featuring their artwork. The calendars are a product of art teacher Eugenia Marve's longtime dedication to encouraging student achievement.

The money goes into the Grand Rapids Student Achievement Foundation, and is used to help pay for students' post-secondary education, whether it's college or training in a trade.

The calendars are more than a decorative way to tell what the date is. They provide insight into the students who made them.

Students share their dreams for the future in the calendars. Kha Nguyen wants to be a flight attendant so she can see the world. Rosalinda Tapia wants to make enough money to buy her parents a retirement house in Mexico.

Her drawing of a rose reflects her Mexican heritage.

"In Mexico, the most famous plants are the roses," Tapia said.

The artwork shows what the students have learned in art classes at Grand Rapids schools. Denise Sanchez's drawing is a collage of projects she worked on over the course of a year.

It took Sanchez two months to create the collage, but these kids are used to hard work. Duane Carter lists his goal as maintaining his 3.6 grade point average.
